Message From the President

Fall is coming fast. Trees are losing leaves—not sure if it's the dry spell from a few weeks ago or typical fall behavior...or both! All I know is that I 'm constantly cleaning maple leaves out of the pool! In contrast, the bonsai trees are still green and new growth is hardening up for the winter. Trees are now translocating their sugars and carbohydrates throughout the tree in order to obtain balance. Now is the time to start preparing for winter storage. Clean out that space in the garage, enlarge your cold storage beds (you probably added to your collection this year), or ready your over-wintering area. Keep trees out of the wind. Remember once they are in storage they do need to be watered periodically when soil is dry to the touch. I put snow on mine in the garage so it melts slowly. That's assuming we get snow.

If for some reason you re-pot a tree in the fall, remember it needs extra protection so the roots don't freeze. Also, you may want to apply a fungicide and insecticide prior to storage. Winter can be a good time for structural (hard) pruning, replacement pruning and maintenance pruning. Other dormant period tasks include:

- —Working on jin and shari (dead parts of branches or trunks) whether small or large
- —Doing major work on deadwood on junipers, pines and Prunus
- —Bending trunks and branches, small or large
- —Treating deadwood with jin seal to prevent it from rotting
- —Using jin seal as a preventative measure (dilute 1 part jin seal with 30 parts water) on trunks and major branches of broadleaves.
- —Removing old pine needles from pine branches to allow more light to penetrate. That will allow light to stimulate dormant buds. Sort through terminal buds at the ends of branches leaving only two buds.



From there, Bob traveled to Tochigi-Ken, Japan, where he would spend the next four years under the exclusive direction of world-renowned bonsai artist, Susumo Sudo. After he returned to the states in 1993, Bob spent the next 11 years as the curator of bonsai at the Brooklyn Botanical Gardens in Brooklyn, NY. Bob opened Kifu Bonsai in 2017 and continues to consult for horticultural institutions. As president of the Pennsylvania Horticultural Society he oversees the bonsai exhibit at the Pennsylvania Horticultural Society's annual Philadelphia Flower Show. Bob's personal favorites are Japanese White Pines, Satsuki Azaleas and Japanese Flowering Apricots. Bob resides in a small farming community north of Philadelphia with his wife Jessica and their dogs.
